### The Pastor's Searchlight—November, 2024: "Those Miracle Fruit Jars" (The One Year Book of Amazing Stories, R.



Petterson) Alexander was some kind of genius. In the age before supermarkets, when most Americans lived on farms or tended garden plots in town, preserving food for the winter ahead was a matter of life and death. That's why entrepreneurs like Mason and Ball became household names for mass-producing canning jars. But creating self-sealing lids for those jars became a vexing challenge. That's when Alexander Kerr's inventive mind discovered the secret worth its weight in gold. The problem for Kerr was in finding the capital to mass-produce his product. In 1903 he partnered with John Giles to found the Hermetic Closure Company of Chicago. A year later, he changed the name to the Kerr Glass

Manufacturing Company. He patented another of his inventions, the first threaded ring to hold the lid down—the same method used today. Alexander had mortgaged his home, and he borrowed heavily to finance his new start-up. The competition was stiff and the American economy fragile. Those early days were tough sledding. Yet Alexander Kerr, who had been converted under the ministry of evangelist D. L. Moody, had committed to test God's promise to bless those who tithed—even when he had precious little to give. That belief was severely tested four years after he started his company. It was 1906, and his fruit jars were being produced in San Francisco. On April 18 a massive earthquake hit. Some three thousand people were killed, and 80 percent of the city was destroyed. When Alexander received the news flash, his friends said, "You are a ruined man!" He responded, "I don't believe it. I know God can't go back on His promises!" He wired San Francisco, A devastating answer came back: "Factory in the heart of the fire. Undoubtedly destroyed. Heat so intense will be unable to find out anything for several days." Those were faith-testing days for Kerr's family. About a week later, a second wire came from San Francisco: "Factory miraculously saved." Everything for a mile and a half on all sides of the factory burned, but the factory remained standing! Kerr immediately left for the coast. It wasn't until he got to the site that he saw the amazing scope of God's miracle. His factory was made entirely of wood, containing huge tanks where the glass was melted at hot temperatures, fueled by oil. His building was the most flammable in the area. Yet the raging inferno came only to the edges of the Kerr factory, scorching its fences before jumping over his building to consume whole blocks around it. The fences were not burned, nor was the building singed. So complete was the miracle that not a single one of the thousands of jars was cracked by the massive earthquake or fires that followed. Alexander later spoke in churches, reminding Christians of God's promise to bless those who tithe. If you are tempted to withhold that which belongs to God, you might want to ponder this:

# The most impossible task in life is to outgive God.

Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. (Luke 6:38)

One might be tempted to believe that if we can't outgive God, then what does it matter what we give? But God's Word gives us the formula for how our giving is like investing: the more we trust God, the more God entrusts to us; the more we give, the more God empowers us to give, and the more God surprises us with blessings; and we love because God FIRST loved us! God has always taken the initiative towards us...caring, loving, sacrificing, rescuing, and saving. God is always FIRST! That's why we cannot possibly OUTGIVE God. We have sent out this year's stewardship letter and estimate of giving card for 2025. We ask you to pray and consider how God is encouraging you to partner with Him in serving Christ, and the people of the neighborhoods around Elmwood Church. Let's run toward joy...pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into our laps.
