The Pastor's Searchlight—February, 2025: "The Greatest Gift of All" (The One Year Book of Amazing Stories, R. Petterson)



Few people remember this Filipino kid from the slums. He wanted to get an education, but poverty forced him to work as a day laborer. Like all of us, he longed to do something significant with his life, but he would probably live out his days as a manual laborer on construction jobs. Then tropical storm Ketsana roared across the Philippines, bringing more rain than the islands had seen in forty years. Within hours, killer floods were rampaging across the nation, wiping out villages and sweeping whole families to their deaths. Almost a million people were left homeless in the wake of that monster storm.

When the floodwaters churned through his village, Muelmar tied a long rope around his waist. One by one, he got his mother and family to safety on higher ground. Then he went back to save others. He dove into the torrent and swam from rooftop to rooftop, rescuing mothers and their children. As he pulled them to safety, he was growing progressively weaker. No one knows how many times he dove into those deadly currents, but he managed to get thirty people to safety. The exhausted teen finally collapsed on dry ground, shivering with hypothermia. That's when he heard the frantic screams of Menchie. This young mother was being swept down the river as she clung desperately to a Styrofoam box with her six-month-old daughter in her arms. Muelmar ignored the warnings of his family and his dog-tired body to dive into the raging waters once again. No one knows how he managed to pull Menchie and her baby girl to safety. But even heroes finally give out. Those on the shores watched in horror as Muelmar was swept downriver. They found the teen's battered body a few days later. As those he rescued gathered around his makeshift grave, his mother Maria wept uncontrollably, His father, Samuel, said to reporters from nearby Manila, "He always had a good heart. It was typical of him to have given his life for others." Menchie held on tight to her little one and said, "He gave his life for me and my baby, and I'll never forget his sacrifice." It's been a decade since Muelmar Magallanes gave his life to save those thirty people from certain death. In those September floods that came to the Philippines, he wrote the Christmas story all over again. God's Son dove into a raging flood of sin and misery, giving his life to rescue us. This is as good a time as any to remember the amazing story of a day laborer from the poor side of Manila. Say his name out loud: Muelmar Magallanes. Then go out and dive in somewhere to grab hold of someone who is being swept away. Grab on to them for dear life, just like Muelmar and Jesus.

In rescuing others from an unnecessary death, we rescue ourselves from a meaningless life.

Rescue those being led away to death; hold back those staggering toward slaughter. If you say, "But we knew nothing about this," does not he who weighs the heart perceive it?

(Proverbs 24:11-12, NIV)

In this day and age...in this nation, RIGHT NOW...we are enslaved by greed, corruption, power-hungry oligarchs and self-serving narcissists. And yet, here is the story of a young man who sacrificed everything to save as many folk as possible, with no promise at all that he would ever get anything out of it. A very real and profound example of servanthood, of self-sacrifice, of the heart of Jesus Christ. The Church will be tested severely in the next several years by our own twisted desire to grab power for personal ambitions and not for God's will. Will we answer God's call to stand with the minority for justice or for selfishness? I pray we accept God's call!
