The Pastor's Searchlight—March, 2025: "The Birdman of New York" (The One Year Book of Amazing Stories, R. Petterson)



Nikola left his cheap hotel room each morning, repeating the same routine with clockwork predictability—shuffling to the same market, rummaging through the same threadbare pockets, and forking over the same amount of change to buy the same seeds. He would hobble to the same park, sit on the same bench, and feed his pigeons, often sitting among them until sundown. When he wasn't talking to his birds, the old man mumbled to himself in agitation. Passersby dismissed Nikola as the strangest bird of all. If he saw a woman wearing pearls, the birdman would fly into a rage. He

abhorred pearls and didn't mind ordering the offending person to go home and put on appropriate jewelry. If someone brushed up against him, he would react violently. He might have been covered with pigeon droppings, but he was deathly afraid of germs. No one would have guessed that ragged Nikola once occupied a lavish suite in the Waldorf Astoria, Back then, political leaders, titans of industry, and the crème de la crème of high society toasted his genius. Rudyard Kipling, John Muir, Mark Twain, and J. P. Morgan had been numbered among his closest friends. Now only pigeons came to pay homage to the crazy old man whose face had once emblazoned the cover of **Time** magazine. People who watched the birdman argue with himself didn't know that he was working out his formula for a death ray that could knock ten thousand enemy airplanes out of the sky. Though British and American authorities had dismissed his idea as the ravings of a mad scientist, the Soviets had promised \$25,000 for his plan. Onlookers would have been shocked to know that the birdman was the genius of the ages. Long before he spent his days feeding pigeons, he had created AC electricity and more than three hundred other inventions. As early as 1901 he had envisioned formulas for smartphone technology and the concepts that would lead to X-rays, particle beams, the Internet, and many other things we take for granted today. Nikola had come to America in the late 1800s with four pennies and a dream. At times he dug ditches to make ends meet. Yet this towering intellect became the father of the electronic age. But Nikola's futuristic visions were so far ahead of his time that he bitterly gave up on a disbelieving world. He tore up his royalties in the Westinghouse company that would have made him a billionaire. In the end, Nikola Tesla, one of the greatest inventors of the twentieth century, preferred pigeons to people. Nikola Tesla died a recluse with large debts and a lifetime of unfulfilled dreams. It has been said that there is a thin line between genius and craziness. Too often the greatest mind cannot comprehend what the simple faith of a child easily grasps. Even if you are a genius, you're crazy to ignore this wisdom:

If you gain everything but lose your soul, you have gained nothing.

What do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul? (Mark 8:36)

Nikola Tesla, the honored namesake for Elon Musk's company, was also known by Donald Trump's uncle (John G. Trump), who was an electrical engineer and was asked to review all his documents in his apartment after he passed away, to make sure that there wasn't any invention paperwork that could be dangerous for others to get their hands on. Tesla was a genius, but he lost himself in his pursuit of attempting to invent, to create, to envision. Because his intelligence was so far beyond most people, he became frustrated by their inability to see what he saw, to see the future! He ended up losing his soul in many ways in the process, and truly gained nothing. His family line, Elon Musk's family line and Trump's family line have followed in those footsteps...in attempting to gain the whole world (via wealth & power), they have, they are and they will lose everything. In stark contrast to their meaningless lives, we follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ, who came to serve ALL of humanity (not judge or condemn) as he sacrificed everything for OUR sake on the cross. And the result has been the most meaningful life ever lived!





Presbytery Highlights - February 18, 2025

The Presbytery of Lake Erie met by Zoom on Tuesday, February 18, 2025. The music team of Montgomery Service, Mitchell McVay, and Leslie Weber from First Presbyterian Church of the Covenant lead us in song. Rev. Buddy Ward from North Warren preached a sermon about the marks of Effective Church Leadership based on Philippians 3. We remembered all pastors, elders, and deacons from our Presbytery who died in 2024 with our annual necrology report. There were several items of business such as:



 Adding the McKay Fund to the permanent endowment fund established by the Woodcock Gravel Run Administrative Commission for ongoing ministry in Crawford County.

- Setting session moderators for churches without a pastor, granting Member at Large status to Rev. Robin Sharp and Rev. Tim Solomon and Honorable Retirement status to Rev. Buddy Ward
- Heard about youth events upcoming from a Spring Retreat in April at Camp Mission Meadows, workshops on intergenerational ministry in May, camper scholarships and ministry grants, and national gatherings for Middle School and High School youth.
- Talked again about the Seneca Nation and an apology and actions toward reconciliation by our Presbytery. Rev. Anita Bernhardt asked that the Presbytery make this a focus in 2025.
- Offered prayers for our partners around the world and in particular Josh Heikkila as he transitions away from being our mission partner in West Africa and for the mission in Ghana after a fire at a girl's school in Saboba.
- Heard from the Stated Clerk about Annual Corporation reports that all churches in Pennsylvania must complete online before
- Approved many Commission reports and moved to dismiss with thanks the Administrative Commission for Woodcock Gravel Run (Rev. Ellie Johns-Kelley, Jay Shimek, Sharron Diley, Ben Haytock, and moderator Rose Hilliard)
- Approved a restructuring of Permanent Committees in the Presbytery, eliminating the Congregational Life Committee and reassigning its tasks (Mission Studies to Committee on Ministry; Energy grants to Trustees, and Bold New Initiative Grants to Mission and Social Witness
- Voted on the final one of the amendments to the Book of Order proposed by 2024's General Assembly as follows: Voted to affirm the changes to reporting of alternative ordination exams
- · Sent our collection to relief efforts by the Presbytery of Western North Carolina for help with Hurricane Helene relief
- Celebrated with Rev. Charlie McClung before he moves to Minnesota and celebrated the ministry of Rev. Buddy Ward on his retirement.
